More Than 22,500 Students to Participate in Students@Work Initiative Across North Carolina

Students@Work Week is March 2-6, 2015

Raleigh, NC, March 2, 2015 – North Carolina's schools and businesses are kicking off the fifth annual Students@Work Week. The goal of the initiative is to raise North Carolina's graduation rate by offering middle school students a look at future opportunities in the workplace.

Some of the programs that will be taking place throughout the week include a tour of the Governor's plane, interactive science activities, a glimpse inside the Department of Transportation's video nerve center and computer building and refurbishing.

The Students@Work initiative focuses its efforts on middle school students because middle school is a pivotal point for dropout prevention. "Students@Work serves a vital role in helping to keep our children in school," said State Superintendent of Public Instruction June Atkinson. "Through this program, our state's businesses are able to show thousands of students firsthand why their education is so important."
