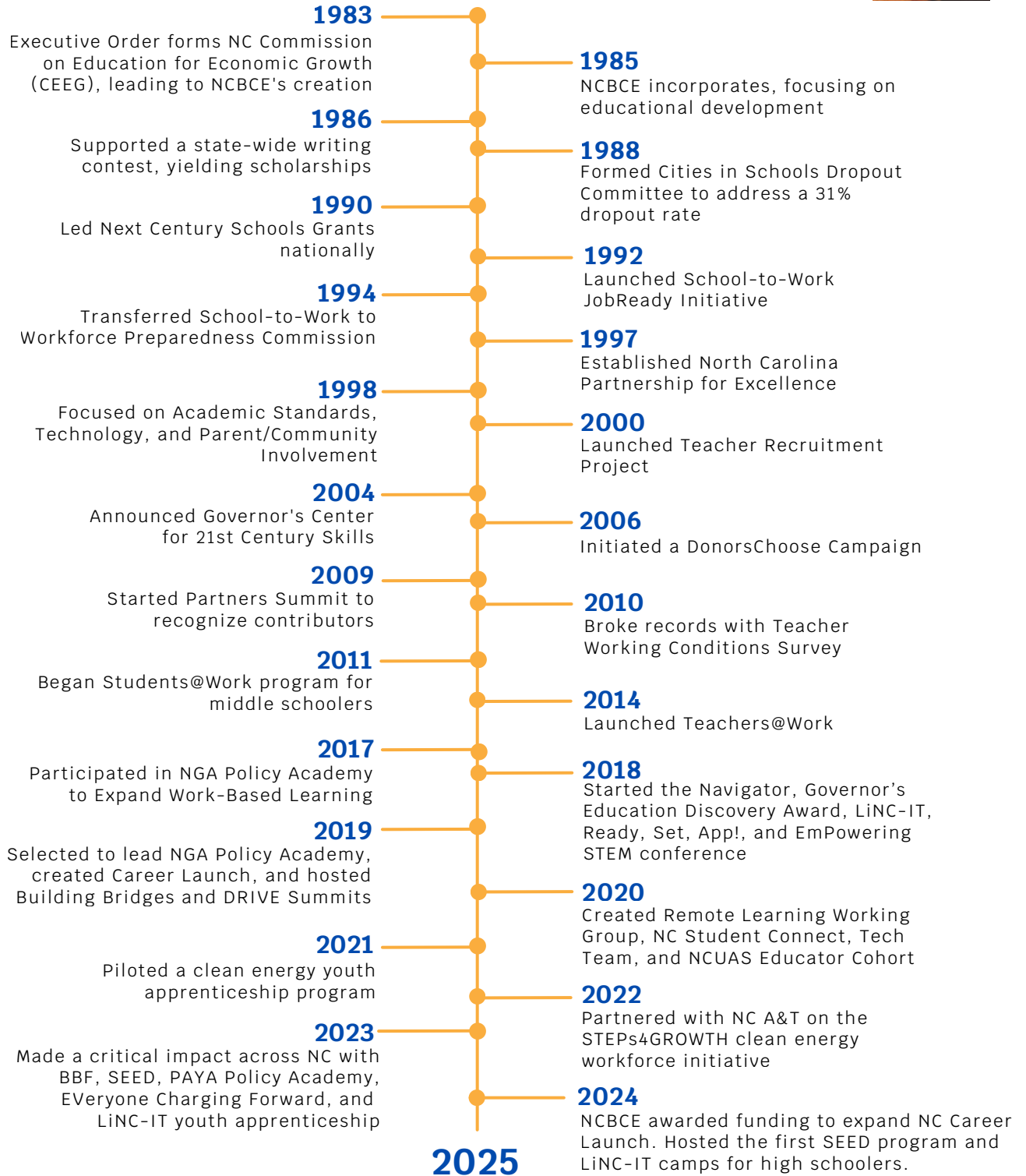
Support NC businesses to build their talent pipeline.

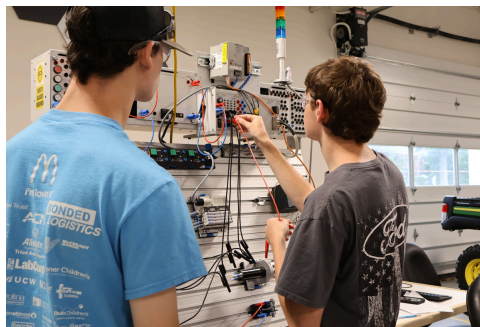

NCBCE Today: Supporting Work-Based Learning



NC Career Launch programs are designed to increase statewide postsecondary credential attainment and connect students to high-demand jobs through youth pre-apprenticeships. NC Career Launch puts students on the path to a career with growth and a living wage. Programs have paid, supervised work blended with aligned classroom instruction, resulting in an industry-recognized credential or college credit.

PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: NCCL partnered with Johnston Community College to offer a BioWork Pre-Apprenticeship program in advanced manufacturing for rising seniors and recent graduates on the autism spectrum. The 140-hour BioWork Certification teaches foundational skills for careers in biotechnology, pharmaceuticals, and chemical manufacturing. The curriculum was adapted to be more accessible and include employability skills, and the program concluded with a Reverse Job Fair where students showcased their skills and connected with potential employers.



NCBCE Today: Supporting Work-Based Learning



NC Tech Works is a statewide work-based learning initiative that advances digital citizenship while preparing high school students for careers in information technology and related fields. With two innovative programs, Tech Team and Digital Ambassadors, NC Tech Works gives students meaningful paid work experience while addressing critical technology and workforce needs across North Carolina.

Tech Team is a work-based learning program that trains high school students to provide IT support and device repair within their school and school district. Students gain hands-on technical experience, industry certifications, and career exposure while helping keep technology accessible for their peers and teachers.

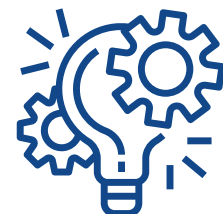

Southeastern Education and Economic Development (SEED)

is focused on growing the advanced manufacturing and agriculture workforce through work-based learning and apprenticeships. SEED began its focus with pathways in Industrial Systems and Mechatronics, two industries in high demand in southeastern North Carolina, and is expanding to include more career pathways each year.

NCBCE Today: Supporting NC Educators

NCBCE AI Fellows, developed in partnership with Google.org, is designed to create a network of exceptional educators to serve as AI leaders and mentors for school communities across the state. This model will expand learning opportunities, spark enhanced interest and engagement with ethical AI practices, and prepare students with critical thinking and AI literacy skills essential for today's careers. Fellows receive regular professional development, a technology mini-grant, and a community of support through mentorship and leadership training.
